Be Prepared for Periods of Rain, Heavy Snow, and Strong Winds in Mammoth Lakes

- The Town of Mammoth Lakes is notifying all residents and visitors to be prepared for an Atmospheric River event bringing high elevation snow, lower elevation rain and strong winds to Mammoth Lakes beginning TONIGHT, Friday (1/31), through Thursday (2/6).
- An active storm pattern with deep atmospheric river moisture arrives tonight and will continue through next week, producing gusty to strong winds and steady rainfall with higher elevation snow. Long periods of nearly continuous rainfall is forecast this weekend in lower elevations causing substantial rises in creeks and streams. Snow levels will drop next week with heavy snowfall resulting in travel impacts in the Eastern Sierra through the entire week.
- In the interest of public safety, the top of Davison Road will be closed this evening in advance of the storm. Access for homeowners will be available from Lake Mary Road.
- A High Wind Watch has been posted from Sunday morning (2/2) through Sunday evening.
- Material to prepare sandbags will be available at the Town Yard (299 Commerce Drive) between 8am – 5pm from Saturday (2/1) through Monday (2/3). Follow the signs to the “Cinder Shed” from Commerce Blvd. Please do not place the sandbags in the roadway.

Building Community Resilience

- In the wake of the devastation from the recent Southern California wildfires, the Town of Mammoth Lakes is taking an extra hard look at wildfire risk in our community.
- In partnership with the [Mammoth Lakes Fire Department](#), [Mammoth Community Water District](#), the [Whitebark Institute](#), and the [U.S. Forest Service - Inyo National Forest](#), the Town is working collaboratively on systems and response tactics to make the most meaningful impact in times of wildfire disaster.
- Together, these entities are developing task-specific community projects centered around removing hazards within the Town boundaries while helping homeowners assess and address their defensible spaces.
- Prior to spring, the partners will be developing and sharing these programs. Once the snow begins to melt, we hope we can count on our community members to do their part to address their own homes and local neighborhoods, as well.
- Please be on the lookout for more information about these programs and plan to be engaged in the process. While there is no silver bullet to prevent these types of disasters, if we all work together, we can build a more resilient community.
